

#### **Membership at a Glance:**

- » Total membership for 2013-2014 was 7,889—an increase of 3% over 2012-2013.
- » The international membership categories continue to grow, with International membership increasing by 6.2% and International Resident membership increasing by 121% over 2012-2013.
- » Other membership categories also saw an increase over 2012-2013, including Auxiliary, Educator, Federal Dental Health Services, Predoctoral Student and Resident.
- » The year-to-year membership retention rate increased to 93.6% between 2012-2013 and 2013-2014, from 92% between 2011-2012 and 2012-2013.

# Striving for Perfection: The 2014 Annual Session

The 2014 Annual Session in Washington, D.C., focused on trends and advancements in the rapidly changing field of endodontics. More than 160 expert presenters, new educational tracks on surgical endodontics and regenerative therapies, hands-on workshops and an impressive Exhibit Hall created a high-caliber educational experience for the nearly 3,700 attendees.

A special addition to the educational program was the General Session on the first day of the meeting. Featuring presentations by six innovators in dental research and endodontic treatments—Dr. Michael Glick, Dr. Martha J. Somerman, Col. Robert G. Hale, Dr. Kenneth M. Hargreaves, Dr. Syngcuk Kim and Dr. Shane N. White—the General Session brought attendees together to learn about key topics affecting endodontics and dentistry as a whole.

"When everyone hears the same thing in the afternoon, everyone is thinking and talking about the same thing that evening, which leads to a 'community conversation,'" said Dr. David E. Witherspoon, 2014 Annual Session program chair. "Great things can come out of that type of discussion that's occurring on a larger scale."







#### **Education at a Glance:**

- » The 2014 Annual Session in Washington, D.C., drew close to 3,700 attendees from more than 40 countries.
- » A record-breaking 625 people attended the 2013 Fall Conference in Las Vegas, *Contemporary Concepts in Periradicular Surgery: Diagnosis and Treatment.*
- » Approximately 150 residents attended APICES 2013 at the University of Iowa. APICES is the only continuing education meeting planned for endodontic residents, by residents.
- » More than 100 CE hours were added to the <u>Live Learning Center</u>, including meeting recordings and *Journal of Endodontics* articles.
- » The 2013 Department Chairs Workshop brought leaders from 56 endodontic programs together to discuss faculty development, recruitment and retention.
- » The <u>Recommended Guidelines of the AAE for the Treatment of Traumatic Dental Injuries</u> were updated and released as an e-book. Updates include recommendations for utilizing 3-D imaging and revised treatment timelines.

The AAE's outreach initiatives promote the skills and expertise of endodontists to general dentists, corporate entities and the public at large. Through education materials for patients and general dentists, events for corporate partners, social media channels and more, the AAE works to combat harmful misinformation, raise the public profile of the specialty and position AAE members at the forefront of health care.



# Putting Patients at Ease: Patient Education Videos

In an effort to help members explain endodontic procedures and alleviate patients' fears, the AAE released high-quality patient education videos on root canal treatment, retreatment and cracked

teeth in April. Developed by the Public and Professional Relations Committee, the videos feature 3-D animation and narration to help patients understand common dental symptoms as well as the unique skills, training and technologies that endodontists possess. AAE members can download these videos for free to embed in their practice websites and share in their operatories. The AAE also posted the videos on its website and YouTube channel for easy viewing by the public and other dental professionals. As of June 30, the videos had received close to 4,300 views combined.

The response has been overwhelmingly positive. "The AAE videos have proven to be a great asset for our practice," said AAE Member Dr. Kenneth J. Zucker, who shows the videos to patients while they wait for anesthesia. "Patients have the opportunity to learn about endodontic procedures, and in most all cases, this allays their anxiety and misconceptions. Thanks, AAE, for this great patient education tool!"







#### **Outreach at a Glance:**

- » Three new patient education videos were produced for members to use on their websites and in their operatories.
- » The <u>Root Canal Safety webpage</u> was launched during Root Canal Awareness Week to debunk myths linking root canals and disease.
- » <u>Treatment Options for the Compromised Tooth: A Decision Guide</u> was updated and mailed to more than 32,000 general dentists. The *Guide* encourages dentists to explore endodontic treatment options before recommending extraction.
- » The AAE's social media presence grew in 2013-2014, gaining nearly 2,400 Facebook "likes" and 650 Twitter followers.
- » The 2013 Corporate Community Conference drew more than 30 industry leaders to discuss issues facing AAE members.
- » More than 40 corporate partners attended the 3rd annual Open House and Breakfast at AAE Headquarters.
- » The awareness campaign ended in June 2014. Over the past 10 years, the campaign has yielded valuable practice marketing materials, patient education resources and market research that will continue to be used in efforts to educate the public and the profession.

The AAE's advocacy efforts give endodontists a voice in the federal and state legislatures, with dental insurers and within the dental community. In partnership with the ADA and dental specialties, the AAE is part of a united front that fights for the issues that affect our members, such as increasing access to care, reducing student loan debt and expanding insurance coverage for new technologies.



# Standing for Dentistry: Ali Behnia, D.M.D., M.S.

As an endodontist and business owner in Maryland, Dr. Ali Behnia recognized early on that participating in dental advocacy was essential to protecting his practice.

"The number of legislative actions that had impacted the practice of dentistry in my state needed to be addressed and we needed to have a voice," Dr. Behnia said.

Dr. Behnia became involved with organized dentistry at the local and state levels and recently served as the AAE representative to the American Dental Political Action Committee board from 2011-2014. As part of ADPAC, Dr. Behnia has been instrumental in supporting pro-dentistry Congressional candidates and lobbying legislators in Washington, D.C. He also helped bring U.S. Rep. Paul Gosar to the 2014 Annual Session for a special advocacy panel. Dr. Behnia has seen his contributions make a difference, and he encourages other AAE members to join ADPAC and get involved with advocacy efforts.

"Personally commit and volunteer," Dr. Behnia said. "Through the ADA and ADPAC and our involvement, we can all stand united and be a monumental force."







#### **Advocacy at a Glance:**

- » AAE leadership met with directors from the largest dental insurers to advocate for coverage for services such as CBCT and post removal on retreatment.
- » An Annual Session panel featuring U.S. Rep. Paul Gosar, Indiana State Rep. Dennis Zent and ADA Senior Vice President of Government and Public Affairs Michael Graham offered attendees a "behind-the-scenes" perspective of endodontic advocacy.
- » The AAE kept members informed of important regulatory and compliance issues, including new HIPAA, Affordable Care Act and Sunshine Act rules.
- » Through the Organized Dentistry Coalition, the AAE lobbied federal legislators on issues affecting dentistry, such as expanding access to dental service and federal student loan relief.
- » The AAE supported the American Dental Political Action Committee's efforts to elect dentist-friendly legislators, including Idaho dentist U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson and Brian Babin, a Texas dentist expected to win election to Congress in November.

# Gaining a Global Perspective: International Connections

To fulfill the AAE's vision to be a leading global resource for endodontic knowledge, research and education, AAE leadership has made it a priority to strengthen relationships with international endodontic organizations. President Dr. Gary R. Hartwell attended the annual meeting of the Brazilian Endodontic Society, where he was part of a panel discussion

with international endodontic faculty. In September, President-Elect Dr. Robert S. Roda attended meetings of both the European Society of Endodontology and the Canadian Academy of Endodontics. The international fellowship continued at Annual Session as AAE leadership met with the International Federation of Endodontic Associations, the Asian Pacific Endodontic Confederation and a variety of other national endodontic groups.

In addition, the *Journal of Endodontics* Editorial Board Committee published a special online issue, in partnership with the International Association of Dental Research, that featured presentations from the IADR's Pulp Biology and Regeneration Group Satellite Meeting.

"The AAE is inextricably tied to endodontics throughout the world," Dr. Hartwell said. "Collaborating with our international colleagues and being a good global partner helps strengthen the specialty everywhere."







#### **Governance at a Glance:**

- » The Board of Directors implemented a new self-evaluation process to measure its performance as a governing body and to begin tracking year-over-year progress.
- » The Membership Services Committee created a comprehensive Member Needs Survey, distributed to all members in September. The <u>survey results</u> are being used to inform future AAE activities and priorities.
- » The JOE Editorial Board Committee published presentations from the International Association of Dental Research Pulp Biology and Regeneration Group Satellite Meeting as a special online issue.
- » The Special Committee on Quality Improvement developed an organizational profile for the AAE that details the Association's operating environment, goals and key challenges.
- » During 2013-2014, special committees addressed the changing needs of the AAE and its members by studying areas such as:
  - The effects of changing practice models, demographics and debt on endodontic practice
  - Faculty recruitment and retention
  - Continuing education strategy

## 2013-2014 Statement of Financial Position

Page 10 of 17

The annual audit of AAE finances, conducted by Selden Fox, Ltd., was completed in September 2014. The financial information presented below is taken from the audited financial statements. The net operating deficit is (\$85,815) which is \$138,534 less than the budgeted net operating deficit of (\$224,349).

The net operating deficit does not include any unrealized gains or losses on investments. At the end of the year, the auditors do want to have that amount captured on our financial statements. This year, there was an unrealized gain of \$669,729; therefore, the net surplus would be \$643,457.

The AAE Reserve Fund was \$6,946,720 in June 2014, compared to \$6,122,814 in June 2013, a 12% increase, due to ongoing market activity.

#### Foundation at a Glance:

- » \$1.7 million was allocated in the 2014 Foundation budget for grants.
- » The Foundation selected Dr. Nikita B. Ruparel for the 2013 Endodontic Educator Fellowship award (see page 12) and continued Fellowship support to Drs. Johnah C. Galicia and Tory L. Silverstrin.
- » A \$100,000 Endowed Faculty Matching Grant was awarded to the University of Detroit Mercy, helping to ensure that endodontics is taught by endodontists.
- » The first \$25,000 AAE Foundation/DENTSPLY Innovation in Research Awards were given to the University of Maryland and University of Toronto (see page 12).
- » The Foundation awarded the first multi-center, multi-year research grants in regenerative endodontics:
  - \$200,000 University of North Carolina, New York University and University of Washington
  - \$600,000 University of California at Los Angeles, University of Southern California, Yonsei University Dental College and Kyung Hee University College of Dentistry
  - \$1.7 million University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio, Loma Linda University and University of Maryland

As health care continues to evolve, the Foundation's work ensures that the specialty keeps pace with developments in science and technology. Grants and awards from the Foundation provide critical funding that would not come from any other sources.



## Pursuing a Passion: Nikita B. Ruparel, D.D.S, M.S., Ph.D.

After many years as a student, Dr. Nikita B. Ruparel has loved experiencing school from an educator's perspective. The 2013 Endodontic Educator Fellowship recipient recently completed her first year as assistant professor in the department of endodontics at Loma Linda University School of Dentistry.

"My first year at Loma Linda has been a wonderful learning journey," Dr. Ruparel said. "I have especially enjoyed my interactions with students, both undergraduate and graduate, and have found that nurturing young minds is a very rewarding experience."

In recognition of the essential role educators play in strengthening the specialty, the Endodontic Educator Fellowship award provides \$50,000 each year for five years to individuals who are beginning or recently began careers in education. Applicants must have secured a full-time teaching position in an endodontic department at an institution that is accredited by or has a reciprocal agreement with the Commission on Dental Accreditation.

The Foundation's support makes it financially possible for endodontists like Dr. Ruparel to pursue careers in education. "I am immensely grateful to the AAE Foundation for facilitating me to be a part of this academic family," she said.

#### Partnering to Promote Innovation: The AAE Foundation and DENTSPLY Tulsa Dental Specialties

The AAE Foundation/DENTSPLY Innovation in Research Award is an example of how successful partnerships can leverage resources to benefit science and the specialty. Introduced in 2013, the award aims to stimulate scientific developments and build research capacity in dental school endodontic departments, while raising the specialty's profile at universities across North America.

The Foundation and DENTSPLY will collaborate to award two \$25,000 grants annually over the next four years. A special committee, chaired by Dr. David C. Funderburk and composed of four Foundation trustees and two DENTSPLY representatives, evaluated the applications in early 2014 and selected the University of Maryland and the University of Toronto as the first recipients.

The University of Toronto's research will explore the use of functionalized bioactive nanoparticles and photodynamic therapy in root canal treatment and related procedures. The University of Maryland will direct the funding to understanding and improving healing outcomes and delivery of endodontic care.
