THE INSIGNIA appearing on the front cover is the official emblem of dentistry, approved by the American Dental Association in 1940 (not to be confused with the emblem of the Association itself).

The design employs as its central figure the serpent of Aesculapius, father of medicine, entwined about an ancient Arabian cautery. The periphery of the design is formed by a combination of the Greek letter (delta) for dentistry, and the Greek letter (omicron) for odont (tooth).

In the background are 32 leaves and 20 berries, signifying the two sets of teeth.
