Antimicrobial agents assist the body in overcoming an infectious process. At conclusion, participants should be able to understand that:

 Antibiotics differ from all other categories of therapeutic agents.

In the absence of adequate host defenses, the most powerful antibiotic may not subdue the most susceptible pathogen.

Antibiotic abuse and misuse is, unfortunately, a major problem primarily because physicians fail to recognize and accept simple principles and guidelines.

Antibiotic therapy is almost always initiated before precise cultural data are available, but knowledge of "bacteriologic statistics" and use of the Gram-stain can make this selection process far more precise than merely surrendering to the concept of "broadspectrum coverage."

Excessive antibiotic use is expensive, unnecessary, and harmful.

The "art of medicine" is most apparent in the area of surgical infections (more accurately, infections occurring against a background of surgical events) and in learning to recognize and acknowledge the limitations of antibiotic therapy.
